### 1ST CYBER FLASHING CONVICTION

Cyber flashing involves offenders sending an unsolicited sexual image to people via social media or dating apps but can also be over data sharing services such as Bluetooth and Airdrop. In some instances, a preview of the photo can appear on a person's device – meaning that even if the transfer is rejected victims are forced into seeing the image.

A registered sex offender from Basildon was the first person in England and Wales to be convicted of cyber-flashing, which became an offence on 31 January 2023.
